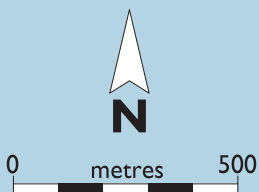

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Helping you get around

More people are choosing to walk, wheel and ride to get around Fremantle. Replacing short car trips with active travel helps you connect with your community and is also great for your health and the environment.

This map identifies walking and bike friendly routes, quiet streets, on-road bicycle lanes and shared paths to help you plan your journey.

Think about the local trips you make such as going to the shops, dropping the kids at school or visiting friends. Which could you do by walking, wheeling or riding?

Catch a bus or train as part of your journey

Use this map to see if you can walk, wheel or ride to the train station or bus stop.

Lock up your bike

You can park your bike at train stations for free and lock it up in the secure bike shelters identified on the map.

eRideables



Know the rules to keep everyone safe. eRideables must travel 10 km/h or less on footpaths and 25 km/h or less on shared paths.

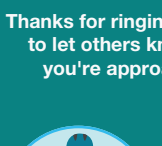
